Climate Action Project

This year, 3,400,000 kids from 149 nations participated in the Climate Action Project, a global endeavor. Our seventh-grade children were included in this group. The Climate Action Project was a free 6-week program that allowed me to interact with seventh-grade kids on environmental issues. Throughout the project, we investigated the causes and impacts of climate change and had the opportunity to create solutions and take action. The project strives to alter students' and society's attitudes toward climate change and environmental threats through education. First, in our seventh-grade classroom, we calculated our global footprint. Then, we considered individual solutions for coping, followed by creating an awareness leaflet and an in-depth examination of the Paris Peace Accord, including a discussion of why countries would or would not sign and what changes should be made to the accord.

This effort is endorsed by His Holiness the Dalai Lama, Queen Elizabeth II, Dr. Jane Goodall, world leaders, and the education ministries of sixteen nations.


United Nation Decade Of Action 2020-2030



My Experience at The German PASCH Camp

During the month of November, I got the opportunity to attend a German STEM Camp from Goethe Institute. This included a 4-day trip to Coimbatore, and Tamil Nadu. This was a camp based on Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM). In this camp, I learnt about technology and resources, inventors of Germany, future of energy and recycling. This camp taught me a lot about energy resources and the inventions which originated from Germany. Not only did I learn about this, but it also improved my fluency and vocabulary in German. I also got the opportunity to meet other students from different schools and interact with them. The workshops conducted throughout were very interactive, informative and fun. Various games and activities were also planned in order to make the learning fun! Besides the workshops, there were other activities planned like a morning trek. A mask making session was also held alongside an up-cycling fashion show. This helped in unmasking my creative abilities. The fashion show tested our creative skills. We were asked to create a useful piece of clothing or an everyday useful objective out of recyclable materials. Our team came up with a cooking apron made out of garbage bags. We also were given the chance to make our own invention from scratch. For this, my team and I came up with a unique pen that checks your concentration level while working. Overall, this was a very good exposure to the German language and culture. It also improved my German vocabulary, knowledge. It also taught me a lot about science and technology. I look forward to many more camps and golden opportunities like this.

Investigating Enzyme Activity

In our biology class, we conducted some experiments to study the effects of different conditions; which were temperature, pH and concentration; on enzymes. We were split into groups of two and given one specific condition that we had to conduct an experiment on.

My group had pH as the condition. For the experiment, we had to compare the difference in reaction between liver enzymes and potato enzymes. To do that, we had been given five different pH buffer solutions to use on both the liver and potato enzymes.

First,we would add the enzymes and then add in the pH buffer solutions in 5 liver samples and 5 potato samples. After this, we would add in Hydrogen Peroxide to all ten test tubes, one by one. We would measure the height of the foam that would rise in each of the test tubes to measure the reaction. However, since this was a time-consuming experiment, we were not able to finish it within one class and had to take several classes to obtain our final results.

In the end, by using our results, we had to write a report on the effect of pH on enzymes. This was to train us so that we would be able to write proper reports in our IB years. Overall, this experiment helped all of us understand a lot more about enzymes and helped us develop the practical skills that we need in the lab.

How To Prepare For An Exam?!



It is that time of the year again - the Dreaded Examinations!

Often, learners find themselves in a Catch-22 situation where they know 'what to study' but struggle to wrap their heads around 'how to study' it. Let us break this down into some basic yet essential elements necessary to tame the anxiety and maximize potential before an academic examination.

- 1. Learning strategies: for a 'social learner', explaining your understanding to a group helps you to learn better. A 'solitary learner' prefers self-study and his/her own company during revision. A 'visual learner' loves to revise using pictures, mind maps, images and spatial understanding of concepts. An 'auditory learner' prefers lessons read out. One must understand their needs and determine which style works for you the best.
- 2. The 3 key resources: Utilize the 3 key resources in your learning- your notes, each other and your teachers. Taking good notes is a skill. Nurture this skill by regularly taking good notes and editing at home to develop them in a way that will help you understand the concepts best when you read those notes again. Talking to friends and discussing roadblocks can help resolve more doubts than you think! This is also the quickest way forward and avoids any unnecessary delays in understanding. Your most important resource is your teacher because they know you the best as a learner. Purposeful extra sessions with your teacher can immensely reduce anxiety. However, concerted reading and preparation must go in prior to the extra session so you can make the most of the session. Do not forget to take Notes during this session as well.
- 3. Subject Knowledge Profile: It is vital to identify your strengths and weaknesses in each subject. Know where to start. Create a timeline. Divide all your topics into three categories namely: Really know it, Sort of know it, Don't know it. Start with the topics that fall in the Don't know it category instead of going the other way. Often it is comforting to start with what you already know. This doesn't help! Start with a topic that you don't know and try to move it to the 'sort of know it' category. Next, try to move this to the 'really know it' category. When the majority of your topics start falling in the 'really know it' category, you know you are getting there as far as solid preparations are concerned. Keep a record of this knowledge profile every term, for every subject.
- 4. Study Plan: Do not underestimate the power of a carefully curated timetable. Get yourself a large print out of a weekly planner and start inputting names of subjects in hourly time slots. Do not give up on the things you like to do. Play sports, watch movies, enjoy time with family Put all this into your planner. Leave yourself with enough time for recreation. The study plan must be unique to YOU.
- 5. Environment and physical condition: Finally, you must choose an environment conducive to you study. Do not lock yourself in a room for hours. Take frequent walks around the house. Eat healthy and give yourself 7-8 hours of sound sleep at night. Exercise by stretching or doing yoga for short durations in between. Keeping yourself physically active will allow you to avoid being sluggish.

You will never change your life until you change something you do daily. The secret of your success is found in your daily routine. Make all the above habits a part of your routine, and success is sure to follow.

Inter House Football Tournament - Secondary & Primary

The tournament was organized in MFH.

The Inter-House Football Tournament took place on 5th November 2022 for the Secondary and IB section. A straight knockout tournament format was applicable for all the categories. 


After all her hard work, all she expects from her students is to know that she wants only the best for her students.


Grades 4-5: Six Dots: A Story of Young Louis Braille

That's when the first ace arrives in the mail.




