By solving a series of unusual — and rather non-scholastic — assignments, young students collect badges that help them advance through the university's course of studies. After completing a Bachelor, Master and Doctorate degree, children eventually graduate from the Kinder University as professors. This elaborate system is based on a highly successful modern didactic method called "gamification". The following GICLM students participated enthusiastically in this championship: Jeehaan Tataria, Rashi Assar, Kiara Shah, Dhruteesh Rupani, Aarav Gudka, Riona Shah, Vihaa Shah, Hriday Agarwal and Kian Singla.




Hindi Divas

An Interview with the New Psychology Teacher and Counsellor





What are your educational qualifications? What do you specialise in?

Ms Amretta Dandona has completed her Master of Arts (MA) in Counselling Psychology after three years of undergraduate and two years of postgraduate studies. She has given the NET exam to become an assistant professor in psychology, and has received a diploma degree in Human Resources and Development. Lastly, she also underwent more specialised training to become a counsellor along with her first job.

Can you explain what interested you and what motivated you to become a psychologist / psychology teacher?

Ms Dandona knew from a very young age that she had the ability to calm people down and console them. She also realised that she knew how to be there for them during their hardest times. Additionally, after she completed tenth grade, no mainstream subject like math or science appealed to her, which led her to pick psychology in eleventh grade. She had absolutely no idea as to what it was, but it turned out to be one of her best decisions and she knew right then that if she wanted to have a successful career, it had to be in the field of psychology!

If you were not a teacher, what would you be?

When asked this question, Ms. Dandona didn't have to think twice. She never thought that she'd be a teacher, as she was more inclined to become a counsellor since she spent a lot of time training for it. Her introduction to the teaching profession was very abrupt and was suggested to her by her professor. She wasn't employed at that time and her professor suggested the teaching path, as she is good at public speaking and had all the required degrees and expertise in the field. This is where her career took off! If given the choice now to become a counsellor, she says that she would not drop teaching for it. She truly enjoys her job and is extremely hard working and dedicated towards it. She also says that she is always there for anyone who needs to talk and she can always be the counsellor figure in their lives.

What is one of the most interesting things that has happened in your career so far?

She gave an example of her student who she taught in Grades 11 and 12. While teaching this student, she noticed a few changes in her behaviour and how she wouldn't want to interact with her classmates. After discussing it with her, Ms Dandona realised that she was facing a bunch of challenges stemming from her family. Ms Dandona continues to talk to her regularly, even after the student has graduated, and she says that her proudest moment is to see her grow as a person, better herself, and overcome her personal challenges.



Any words of advice for aspiring psychologists?

"Psychology is a very vast topic and is prevalent in your everyday life," she said. To do something successfully in this field, you have to identify your personality and traits along with the subject. An example she gave was that a lot of times students are good at research and enjoy sitting in one place to find relevant information, while other students may be good at the more vocal aspect of psychology and may be better at helping others by listening and giving small words of advice. Lastly, some people may be better at testing and applying the research in labs. Here, all the three types of students can be psychologists, but different working in aspects of psychology such as becoming a clinical research associate, counsellor, or a clinical psychologist respectively. Therefore, she said that when one looks for possible careers, one will have to consider multiple different aspects of themselves.

How do you feel about the school environment? Were you able to settle down comfortably?

Ms Amretta said that even though we are not able to physically be in school, she felt extremely warm and welcome here at GICLM. Adding on, she also feels like the school understands that all she wants is the best interest of her students and they respect her voice and decisions.


Is there anything particular that you are looking forward to?

The festival is celebrated among Hindus, which lasts for 10 days. It is celebrated to mark the birth of Lord Ganesha. We were all happy to enjoy the Ganesh Chaturthi holidays from the 10th - 14th September 2021, but have you ever wondered the Symbolic Reason behind this holiday? Lord Ganesha has many features that are applicable and need to be adapted in various aspects of our lives. As a student, I feel we should take the following lessons from the deity:

- 1. Big Head symbolises Think Big, Out of the box and do not seize to learn
- 2.Small mouth symbolises talk less, do more
- 3.Pair of Large Ears symbolises Listening to others Attentively more than you talk
- 4. One Broken Tusk represents that Sacrifice is needed for the Pursuit of Wisdom
- 5. A Large Stomach symbolises Digest All Good and Bad in life
- 6. Small eyes symbolises Concentration and Focus and to look beyond what you see
- 7. The Trunk symbolises High Efficiency and Adaptability
- 8. Ladoos are the Rewards of Hard Work, the sweetest thing of all
- **9. Mushak (Mouse)** represents the **Desire** and **Ability** of the Lord to reach every nook and cranny of the mind
- 10. Prasad is exchanged symbolising Giving and Sharing
- 11. Axe to cut all Bonds and Materialistic Attachments

Ganesh Chaturthi 2021

This year, the festival commenced on the 10th of September 2021. The deity presides at homes of people as well as in Sarvajanik Pandals especially constructed for the occasion. The deity presides for a customised timeline of 10 days, 7 days, 5 days, 3 days, and 1.5 days.

Welcoming the Lord

The Lord is welcomed a day prior, generally to accommodate various offerings and celebrations involved with the festival.

Lighting of the Lamp

The auspicious event commences with the lighting of a lamp. Light symbolises Knowledge, Dignity, Hope and Truth. Lighting the lamp helps you clear negativity from your mind and soul. This clears up space for positive thoughts to enter.

Offering Prayers

We had been privileged to honour the deity at our abode for 1.5 days. The day was scheduled with lots of prayers and visitors coming to our home to seek blessings of the Lord and distribution of the Prasad. When Lord Ganesha is brought home, we perform Aarti (sing him praise) twice a day. The purpose of doing Aarti is the waving of lighted wicks before the deities to show gratitude, love and to honour the Lord. Aarti is also accompanied by the ringing of bells, playing of musical instruments and clapping to radiate positive vibrations at home. Some people continue the same ritual for 5, 7 or 10 days.

Gauri

The 5th day is called the Gauri. In many places, Gauri is considered as Lord Ganesha's sister and in some places, they believe Gauri is an avatar of Goddess Parvati, who is the mother of Lord Ganesha. Devotees of Goddess Gauri worship this day to attain wealth and prosperity.

Why is Ganesha Worshipped First?

A lesser-known fact is that whenever we visit a temple, we usually worship Lord Ganesha first... but do you know why? All human thoughts are expressed in the language of words, but the language of Gods, Goddesses, and Deities who live in the astral world is the language of light. It is believed that Ganesha has the 'superpower' to convert the language of words to the language of light so that human thoughts may reach the Gods.

Ananth Chaturdashi - Visarjan, Immersion

The idol of Lord Ganesha is immersed in water so that he may return to his home after his stay at the house of the devotee and the temple where all rituals take place. Earlier immersion was carried out in oceans, lakes, ponds, rivers, and other water bodies. In wake of the increased call to protect the environment, ecofriendly idols with home immersion possibilities have been adopted. This year, we also opted for an environmentally friendly deity at my home. Saying goodbye to your loved ones is always hard, but for a fact, I know that lord Ganesha will come next year too and bless each one of us with his extraordinary powers.

- **Communication** and Writing Skills include your ability to share ideas and information in a clear and concise manner, leaving no room for misunderstanding. Employees with effective written communication skills can convey messages and information clearly despite the lack of visual cues.
- Active Listening Skills can be defined as the ability to listen and understand what the other side is saying and is essential to solve a problem for a client or resolve team conflicts.
- **Creativity** is not only limited to drawing or painting skills, but is also about how you approach tasks and solve problems. Creative thinkers find novel solutions to the problems they face. They use these skills to help their employer see things differently and solve problems in new ways.
- Management Skills help you manage tasks from start to finish. You make sure everything stays on time and also adjust the timeline when things are not going as planned. It is also making sure people get things done and helping them overcome any stumbling blocks they may encounter.




