Our Tiny Doctors!

This month, nursery children explored the names and functions of body parts, and why they are important. Then, they tested their skills in a doctors' office roleplay with peers. Children took turns being doctors and patients. As patients, the children described what the problem was, and which body part was hurting. Few of them mentioned that their fingers were hurt, their stomach was aching, their leg had a cut, their teeth were paining etc. The doctors examined their patients and gave them treatment accordingly with medicines. Doctors also discussed healthy practices like eating nutritious foods, brushing teeth, exercising and staying active.

Science Week- All About Bees

Our children celebrated science week with great zeal and enthusiasm in accordance with the theme-'Sustainability'.

The objective for this week was for our young learners to develop empathy and compassion towards nature, and to understand how to appreciate the beauty around us.

To encourage the children to conserve plants and wildlife, we studied bumble bees as pollinators, along with their importance and habitats.

Stories have a way of making children imagine being in the place of the characters. This develops their sense of empathy as they try to comprehend their actions. To understand the importance of pollination, the tutors narrated the story of the Biplop the bumblebee.

They used different materials like toilet paper roll, utensil scrubber, earbuds, bubble wrap, fallen leaves and crumpled paper. The tutors then cut the paper into flowers for the card. The bees on the card are the thumb prints of the children and the tutors gave the features.

Learning Through Stories

Recently, we listened to the story of Lion and the Mouse to learn the concept of big and small, where children compared the skills of animals to what they are good at. The children enthusiastically shared these skills with their tutors and peers.

Mountain Pattern

Learning to write is a huge process that takes many years. There are distinct stages that children go through, and there are many strategies to help them on the way. One of the best of these in the early days, are pre-writing patterns. They are a bridge between the earliest markmaking and later writing letters. K1 class has been learning varied pre-writing patterns. A new pattern was introduced to K1 class on a regular school day, the mountain pattern, in the form of play through walking on the taped mountain pattern made on the floor by singing the song - "The Bear went över the Mountain" was joyfully done by our students. They also traced the pattern on the sensory tray and traced this pattern with a coloured pencil on the worksheet. Some benefits of pattern writing are fine motor development, correct position of the body and of holding a writing tool, directional sequences and movements etc. Children thoroughly enjoyed learning this pattern and we can't wait to see them transitioning into writing Alphabets in the coming days!





Seeds to Plants- Science Week Activity

This science week, we introduced K1 to the journey of a seed becoming a plant. We kick started the week with the story of a Tiny seed by Eric Carle, which helped them explore the life cycle of the flower and taught them that although a seed is tiny, it can still grow to be the biggest and prettiest of them all. Following it was a live demonstration of the cutting of varied fruits - watermelon, sapodilla, kiwi, dragon fruit, banana, papaya, custard apple etc. Students discovered the different variety andquantity of seeds found in each fruit and learnt about these seeds being edible or non - edible. They also delightfully tasted the fruits of their choice and explored the different seeds with the magnifying glass. Later that week, they learnt the sequence of planting by hands-on activity of planting green gram seed in a pot and observed theseeds progression into a plant each day. The gleam of joy and amazed facial expressions suggested that they were thrilled to see the seeds they sowed grown into a plant. T'was an incredible sight to see! This was concluded with the "Plant parts we eat" worksheet and craft of "Plant Needs" which they thoroughly enjoyed doing. But, this science week would have been incomplete without having an exhibition of the work of our amazing students. Parents were invited for the exhibition and they witnessed all that their child had learnt and were delighted and happy to see the work of their child.

Interhouse Aquatic Meet 2022

GICLM's first aquatic event this academic year, involving various categories concluded with much excitement and tremendous finishes in the third week of September. This Inter-House competition involved participants from Agni, Jal, Prithvi, and Vayu– the four houses. I represented the Vayu house in three of the races (25 metres freestyle, 75 metres freestyle, and the 25 metres relay). I was up against incredible swimmers but I kept my morale high.

The bone chilling cold water of the pool made us get a quick dip in order to acclimatise with the challenging conditions. 





September Book Recommendations

Grades 4-5: Molly's Pilgrim by Barbara Cohen



Grades 9-12: Red Queen by Victoria Aveyard


