#### Time for Timeline







Timelines help students make connections between the present and the past in a visually appealing and chronological way. By arranging the events along a timeline, it's easier for students to understand the relationships that exist between them. Here at GICLM, our aim is to provide enough opportunities for students to explore various tools and visual aids like these in order to make learning fun.

This month, our 8<sup>th</sup> graders have been studying all about the American Revolution in their History class. We began with a bit of individual research on various important events that led to American independence. Arranging these events chronologically into a timeline got students talking about the possibility of some events having led to others, and thus helped establish a link between them. Also, another aim was to create curiosity about the events like 'The French and Indian War', 'The Boston Massacre', 'The Boston Tea Party' and 'The Battle of Lexington and Concord' etc., which were crucial in shaping America's history.

This activity definitely helped enhance students' research as well as analytical skills. It also triggered discussions in groups, building communication skills along the way.

#### WHEEL OF THEODORUS

Grade 9 Additional Mathematics students dove into surds and radicals in the month of December. While discussing the application of these two concepts, real world situations were put in front of students.

The Wheel of Theodorus was a particularly engaging activity which asked students to draw and beautify a spiral into different living beings existing in nature. Students were excited to transfer their knowledge of plotting to draw the wheel according to their choice. This helped our students extend their knowledge of mathematics beyond the syllabus.

To round out the activity, students worked individually to present their work uniquely. All completed work and facts were neatly arranged on chart paper. During this process, students worked to develop their research skills and creativity.

#### **Functions in Nature**

During the month of December, students in Grade 9 investigated how graphing functions are present in nature and in daily life. Some of the examples that come under this are: exponential functions, cubic functions, quadratic functions, periodic functions, and circular functions.

During Maths class, students were asked to click some pictures outside the classroom depicting some functions in order to see how they are present in nature. Then, we used a graphing software called Geogebra to illustrate these pictures with functions and sliders. I really learned a lot about the abundant functions in nature. Overall, this activity showed how math is present everywhere, and how we can model real-life situations through math.


Grade 9

There is maths everywhere: symmetry, graphs, geometry, equations, and more. Maths can be found everywhere in nature, from trees that can form parabolas, to roots that form complex wave patterns. This project taught me a lot about several transformations, how to change graphs to fit the picture, and how to better visualize complex equations.

Some of the transformations I learnt are:


- · In  $ax^2 + bx + c$ , c transforms the graph vertically, a changes the slope, and b changes the maximum/minimum point.
- · In y = |hx|, h changes the slope, in this case, the angle between the 2 rays.
- · In  $y = e^{ax+b}$ , a changes the slope, and b shifts the graph horizontally.
- · In  $y = \sin(ax + b)$ , a changes the frequency of the wave, and b change the starting point (horizontal shift).
- · In  $y = ax^{bx}$ , a and b both change the minimum/ maximum point and the slope.














# **IB Diploma Programme**











#### **Volleyball**



#### Welcome Aryan. How is USA treating you?

#### What is study like at UC Berkeley?

It is tough, being at a top 10 school. I have to keep working hard with a number of papers every term similar to the IB Diploma's Extended Essay. The IB really helped me because the TOK course prepared me well for the type of philosophical debates lecturers like to challenge us with.

#### Did studying at Garodia help you in any way?
